

WHO WE ARE



Founded in 2001, Wildwood Hills Ranch is a 400-acre safe haven located 25 minutes south of West Des Moines in St. Charles, Iowa. We are a year-round facility that serves vulnerable youth and veterans and their families. We make an impact through educational programming, leadership development, job skill training and equine (horse) therapy. All programs are offered through a 100% donor funded system that is at no cost to the individual participant.

Last year alone, we served over 1,027 youth at-risk and veterans and their families. We make a ten-year commitment to the youth that we serve and work with them from age eight to age eighteen. Our Next Steps Program prepares youth at-risk for taking next steps in their lives.

In 2019, in our veteran equine therapy program, we conducted over 150 equine therapy sessions with veterans and their families. Our team of 30+ horses are a key part of the programming we do at The Ranch. Our Equine Director, Lynn Winkelmann, dedicated therapists and gracious volunteers make this program possible. MESSAGE FROM OUR **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

To Our Stakeholders,

2019 was a monumental year and a great way to finish out a decade! It was unbelievable to see God's provision in every facet of our programs. We were able to serve more students than ever before, launch new program initiatives, finish the first cabin out of the five for the Cabins of Hope project and grow our conference center business by 40%! There are so many other accomplishments from this year that I am excited to share with you that are highlighted on pages 3-4.

It has been amazing to continue to see God at work in the lives of our youth. We were able to serve again this year the little sister of one of the girls in the newspaper whose sister was starved to death. She was a head shorter than anyone on her team that was her age last year because of the malnourishment she had experienced, but this year she is only a few inches shorter than her peers.

Another student that had a huge impact on me this year was a student from West Des Moines. When we were talking through our Father Wounds he came up and spoke about his best friend's father. This father made the paper because he came home from work and killed his family and then committed suicide. The student I was talking with retold the story as if he was reliving it all over again. I am so thankful for our therapist Heidi Vermeer-Quist that was there to help de-escalate his raging emotions. It was so good for him to process these emotions with a trained professional. If students don't talk out their emotions, they act them out. We are constantly working with students to adequately and appropriately communicate how they feel. Occasionally students will bring up issues that are best suited to be handled

by a licensed therapist which is why we have established a working partnership with Heidi and her team.

I want to finish this letter with another story of impact and one of the most unbelievable



things I have been privy to: another individual who has been in the news but for very different reasons than the first two stories. Dale grew up poor and was a carpenter that never made more than \$10.50 an hour. He worked at Moehl Millwork and only owned two pairs of pants. One that he wore to work and one he wore to church. When Dale passed in 2005, he left \$3,000,000 and wanted to help people like himself attend college. Because of his generosity, 33 students attended college and graduated debt free! When his foundation no longer had enough funding to send another cohort all the way through college the proceeds were donated to The Ranch. His gift was over \$400,000!!! We are so grateful for the lives that his gift will impact. It is humbling to think about a man that grew up with so little has left a legacy of changing the lives of people he never met...mine included!

Thank you to each and every one of you for your ongoing support of our organization! We couldn't change the lives that we do without your support.

- Added Heidi Vermeer-Quist as a licensed therapist to help with de-escalation and TBRI (a trust-based therapy rooted in trauma informed care).












IMPACT ON YOUTH AT-RISK







10,172 meals were served to children last year who may have not gotten food otherwise.5,416 meals were served and dishes washed by our Young Leader Students.





WHAT MAKES A HERO?

Is it their cape, their mask, their super powers? Or is it their commitment to justice, to stepping in to help when the odds are stacked against them, to defeat evil so others can experience victory and freedom?

From the Diary of a Summer Staff Member

Today was a rough one. It started fine! We began the day with breakfast, then led into our different rotations. Starting with agriculture and fitness, transitioning to art, lunch, and then aquatics. In aquatics, it was creek stomping day! This experience was a little different for me. Ha!

We walked down to the creek and sat on top of the hill above the creek for a moment. Personally, I was a little fearful to go down there because I am not your average "mudding" girl, but by the time I was halfway down the hill to the creek every fear was subdued. As I heard the screeches of excitement and laughter rising from the water below, every apprehension had dissipated. And as I made my final step into the creek, my leg sunk up to my knee in the mud. More than anything I wanted to retreat, but the pure joy on my girls' faces, and the excitement they had, made every second worth it.

At that point, my heart flourished and I realized that this is all or nothing. The impact we are making in these girls' lives is more than just the trivial fun we are having, but it is a matter of the heart we are dealing with. Each child has a story. And a challenge that they have gone through that they didn't deserve. But, right then (in even the smallest moment), I had the choice to show them that there is more. I am here to show them that no matter the depths of the sinking mud, and no matter the amount of gunk that is built up in their hearts from all they have been through, I am here to love them right where they are at. Just like the Lord meets me in the middle of my mess, I am here to help them take their burdens to the One who carries the weight of the world on His shoulders.

This picture didn't all come together until later that night when my beautifully broken heart sat weeping alongside my innocent girls as they shared with me the stories of their pasts.

As little Sophia shared about being locked in a closet for a great amount of time, and only given dog food to eat, and then having to hide away because the horrific bruises on her frail body would reveal the secrets of her abuse to the world. As she told of these terrors all she could do is cry in my arms and ask "why did this happen to me?".

Then, sweet Katie shared about being left fatherless and then eventually taken from her mother. She then was placed with her adoptive sisters and forced to watch them be beaten over and over again. Daily, she would watch their heads be slammed into doors and their bodies be torn down and she never felt safe. These are just stories from two of my girls and there are so many more heart-wrenching stories just like theirs.

Sydney, Lizzy, Maria, Cece, Megan, Lexi, and Shannon all have stories of past hurt and pain. But the Lord, for some reason, has called me (us) to walk through the grime with these tattered souls and see them with His eyes. He calls us to hold them in their suffering and call them priceless, redeemed, and worthy of love. Never have I seen through the eyes of Christ more clearly, but God has so much more for these sweet girls. He sees them for more than the past hurt they have experienced, and He values them as Princesses.

So, as I reflect on today, my heart is so heavy with the burdens of my favorite little princesses, but it is also full knowing that this session at Wildwood Hills Ranch changed their lives forever and that they can carry that deep, authentic love that they have never before received with them for the rest of their lives. Thank you, Lord, for showing me how to love intentionally and to be loved by your consuming love.

We have the privilege and honor of serving many vulnerable youth year-round through our monthly leadership retreat sessions and equine (horse) therapy.

A STORY OF A LIFE TRANSFORMATION— KARLI BOHALL

My name is Karli Bohall. I am currently a sophomore at the University of Northern Iowa, majoring in elementary education and I attended Wildwood for five years. I want to share my story with you...

Growing up, I moved a lot and I lived with my parents and my two sisters.

My dad was in and out of jail which caused my parents to eventually split. We lived with our mom but she constantly had different men and different people in and out of the house.

She eventually found a boyfriend who moved in with his two kids. We started seeing less and less of her and she was always hiding in her room. Later, we found out that she was on drugs and had addiction issues. My older sister had to take care of us and we walked to and from school every day.

Eventually, we were removed from her household. When I was eight-years-old we went to live with my dad and his new fiancé. We lived with them for about seven months but then he got caught up in the same stuff and was put back in jail.

We were forced to move again—this time with our aunt and uncle. Everything seemed to be going well until they decided they couldn't take care of us anymore. We moved again, but this time was thankfully the last.

Our great aunt and uncle took us in and they had previously adopted two boys, so when they asked us if we knew what adoption was, we were filled with joy! They adopted us when I was ten and we've been a big family since.

Fast forward a few years to when I was 13 and my great aunt, who I call mom, asked me if I wanted to attend Wildwood. I

wasn't sure but she began describing all the activities they had like horseback riding, swimming, and team building. It sounded fun so I said yes and she signed me up! The school year came to an end and it was time for me to leave for The Ranch.

I was definitely nervous on my drive there but upon arriving I was showered with warm welcomes from everyone.



I struggled a little that first summer programming session with opening up and meeting new people. But I had so much fun that I wanted to come back.

During this time, I was chosen to be a part of the leadership program. I came back that summer for two sessions and I loved it. I've been back every summer since I was thirteen to continue in the program.

The Ranch has impacted me since I stepped foot into the Gathering Hall the first time. The staff and team leaders are the most loving and caring people I've ever met. They meet every child where they're at. Without The Ranch, I would not be the person I am today.

The Ranch has helped me to trust and open my heart. The walls I built in my heart were broken because of the wonderful people at The Ranch. When my great uncle passed away last summer, they were there for me.

My relationship with God has grown, and The Ranch has shown me that I want to work with children as my career. The Ranch has helped me grow as an individual and I'm glad I said yes to attending five years ago.

EQUESTRIAN PROGRAMFOR VETERANS AND YOUTH AT-RISK

Horses are gentle, docile creatures that have been linked to providing hope, healing and recovery to individuals struggling with PTSD, ADD, anxiety, depression, trauma, brain injuries, abuse issues and stress.

In 2019, The Ranch conducted more than 150 therapy sessions with veterans and their families. Veterans ride the horses, learn drills and routines, perform at parades, horse events and fairs and learn how to care for and groom the horses. During this process, the veterans and families we serve experience life transformation, a new sense of purpose and re-kindled excitement in the concept of contributing to something bigger in the world.

Our veterans travelled as far as Oklahoma this past year and performed at many public events and functions.

It is incredible the impact that our program has on helping veterans recover from the extreme issues they are up against.

Our Wildwood Wranglers drill team aids youth at-risk in overcoming trauma, abuse and neglect while giving them a connection with a horse, a purpose to ride and train and a public outlet to perform at events, fairs and parades.







With 30 horses and an incredible staff of trained professionals, our equine therapy program is top-notch in helping veterans and vulnerable youth overcome trauma. One story we would love to share with you is about a veteran that went through our life changing programming.

Trotting Through Trama

Skepticism and fear accompanied me during my first visit to Wildwood Hills Ranch for equine therapy. Expectations of another failed attempt to heal myself created a wall between client and counselor. In my mind, any treatment conducted outside of a cozy office building was nothing more than witchcraft. Taking pills and going to counseling had become a routine that I engaged in to keep people from worrying about me. The lunacy of thinking I could successfully fake my emotions with a horse like I did with past counselors is humorous to me now. Those horses felt my pain the moment I stepped foot on Wildwood Hills Ranch.

Medication and traditional therapy have offered me little hope over the past decade. Two combat tours in Iraq left me riddled with various physical and mental disabilities that only intensified the longer I put off treatment. Anxiety would later turn into panic and suicide ideation would eventually partner with my depression. At its best, traditional

counseling talked me off the ledge while medication helped numb the pain. However, simply not wanting to kill yourself anymore does not equate itself to a full recovery. A foundation of healthy coping techniques was never established, and damage control had engulfed my life. Progress becomes nearly impossible when you're constantly struggling to breathe.

A casual walk through of how equine therapy works is how I envisioned my first session. That idea was quickly disrupted the moment I was given a rope to catch a horse. My nervous system immediately went into overdrive, which was uncomfortable, but not far off from my usual level of anxiety. No instructions or guidance were given to me as to how the halter should be properly placed on the horse, even after asking a couple times. It was a part of the process, but still provoked me to start looking for my nearest exit, which had become a crucial part of my action plan to combat ongoing panic attacks. Eventually, I would come to the conclusion that no detailed instructions would be given to me before catching the horse.

My approach to walking up to the horse was done so in tip-toe fashion. Being completely oblivious to how I was going to catch the horse caused my body to stiffen up. It was as if I was learning to walk for the first time. Somehow, I was able to drag my body and all its anxiety over to the horse. It wasn't long after that the horse ran away from me and I was left feeling rejected with a pile of horse feces underneath my feet. In hindsight, the horse had every right to be scared of a panic-stricken human coming towards it with a rope in its hand.

The rope, which I later learned was a halter, eventually found its way around the horse's neck. This simple task became the first of several lessons I would learn over the next few months. The sense of accomplishment did not come from putting a rope around a horse, but rather the completion of a task that caused me anxiety. Normally I would run or resist once fear started to settle in. This was the first of several victories I would experience during my time at Wildwood Hills Ranch.

The habit of always having to be told what to do and how to do it saturated my life more than I realized at the time. The Marine Corps does not promote a lot of freethinking within its ranks, and rightfully so. They were training me for war, which does not allow for a lot of time to ask questions. The VA picked up where the Marines left off by telling me what pills I should take. They seemed to have a pharmacological solution to every symptom I presented them with. Anti-depressants and benzodiazepines quickly became my answer to every negative emotion that sprung itself at me. This pattern of behavior went on for many years and is part of what made me come to doubt any type of treatment that didn't involve a pill.

Catching a horse during my first lesson gave me a sense of accomplishment that a pill could never provide me. The halter was not put on correctly, but that did not matter. It was the confidence that I gained from standing up to my fear that compelled me to push forward with the rest of the lesson even after being rejected by a horse. It's the enormous amount of insight I've gained from such simple tasks with the horse that continues to amaze me.

They thanked their parents for everything they had done for them and that summer forever changed their lives and perspectives. They are now extremely close to one another and have frequent communication.



"The Ranch made such a huge impact on our family and changed the dynamics of how our family gets together. The youth at The Ranch made a huge impact on my children. It went both ways. And now, for me, it's all about giving back. One of the key things we've done at The Ranch is build four workbenches. Every project we have done since then has been in contact with those benches—they have been the foundation. It is key that you set up and start with a strong foundation and that is the purpose of The Ranch—building a good foundation," said Brad.






